HANAMATSURI THE CELEBRATION OF BUDDHA'S BIRTH

Hanamatsuri, literally flower festival, is celebrated on April 8, commemorating the birth of Siddhartha Gautama. Siddhartha became enlightened as Sakyamuni Buddha and this marks the release of sentient beings from suffering and sorrow.



According to our tradition, the historical Buddha, Sakyamuni, was born in Nepal on April 8, 566 B.C. He was born the son of King Suddodhana and Queen Maya. There are many flowery descriptions of the scene at his birth, including celestial birds singing beautiful songs, beautiful flowers, and a sweet gentle rain bathing the baby Buddha. It is not necessarily the beauty of the flowers, the sounds of the celestial birds, nor the sweet gentle rain that fell, but the vibrant fact that on this day was born the greatest of sentient beings who became the Enlightened One, the Buddha

Every year we celebrate our own birthday. In our youth we are anxious to reach "adulthood", and in our old age we attempt to cling to our "youth". What is the meaning and reason for celebrating our birth? Much of the meaning of our own birth is often lost in the gifts and the merriment. The celebration of our birth is an expression of gratitude. This gratitude is extended towards our friends, parents and to life itself. This gratitude grows from an understanding that our birth is the result of many people and that our lives are intertwined with all others.

Understanding the Buddha's teaching of interdependency of all things will make it clear that our birth is the result of many causes and conditions. Realizing this we can see that our birth is truly a rare and wonderful gift, and we have an obligation to live out this life in accordance with the teachings of the Buddha.

This obligation to live our lives out to the fullest becomes even more striking when we look at the symbolism and the significance of the flower. The flower, as with all human beings, has its moment of youth and beauty, but its beauty soon begins to fade and eventually it dies. Our birth is like the blossoming of a beautiful flower, but it is the seed of our own demise. When we can understand our own impermanent nature, then it becomes very clear how we should live our lives.

From the murky depths of this quagmire of life, there still are occasions when sentient beings may, out of sincerity of mind, effort and intelligence, produce pure thoughts which may bloom into the ultimate purity of the white lotus, enlightenment. Hanamatsuri represents one of these occasions. It is a time for us to show our gratitude and rededicate ourselves as we contemplate the importance of the birth of our teacher, master, spiritual guide and friend, Sakyamuni Buddha.

This year, we will be cerebrating Birth of Sakyamuni Buddha on April 3, at 9:00am at Aiea Hongwanji, and HBC Hanamatsuri Service will be held on April 10, 9:00am at Higashi Hongwanji Betsuin. Please encourage your family and friend to attend this Great Event. Namo Amidabutsu.

I hope you are in good spirits. We just returned from a short (6 day) trip to New York to visit our son, Craig. We did a lot

in a short amount of time-enjoyed every minute. Ate a lot of good food-New York pizza, Indian curry, Barbecue (smoked pork belly was the best), dim-sum in Long Island City's Chinatown, oysters at the Oyster Bar at Grand Central Terminal, lobster rolls at the Red Hook Lobster Pound, burgers at the Shake Shack, Greek food at a neighborhood restaurant in Long Island and Italian food at Babbo, a wellknown restaurant owned by "Iron Chef" Mario Battali. GOMONSHU'S MESSAGE ON THE COMMEMORATION ON THE ACCESSION OF THE JODO SHINSHU TRADITION. On June 6, 2014, I came to inherit the legacy of the Jodo Shinshu tradition through receiving the transmission from the Monshu Emeritus Ohtani Koshin, succeeding to the posts of the resident priest of Hongwanji and the Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha Monshu. Today, I would like to announce that the Commemoration on the Accession of the Jodo Shinshu Tradition (Dento Hokoku Hoyo) shall be scheduled for the years 2016 and 2017. My succession of the Jodo Shinshu tradition will be officially proclaimed to the Buddha and Masters, and through its observance, it is anticipated that the teaching of Amida Buddha's Primal Vow shall gain prosperity and Hongwanji in its entirety shall achieve further growth.

Amida Buddha's Primal Vow is directed without discrimination to every life and saves them just as they are. Despite our being filled with delusions and suffering, we are enabled to entrust ourselves wholeheartedly to Amida Tathagata's great compassion and be born in the Pure Land, the manifestation of the Buddha's true enlightenment. Although everything in this world, including ourselves, is unreliable, which Shinran Shonin expressed as "empty and false," we are always able to realize the assuredness in the working of the Primal Vow.

Modern scientific and technological sophistication urges us to pursue convenient and luxurious lifestyles, thereby making our desires swell boundlessly. However, I feel that people have begun to realize the futility of these efforts. In addition, such factors as the nuclear family unit and demographic shift from rural to urban areas have forced the conventional social structure to change greatly. As a result, the bonds between people have become weak, causing new anxieties and feelings of uneasiness to arise. On the global scale as well, we can see that there are a number of issues that threaten humanity's existence, such as armed conflict, economic imbalance, climate change, and the proliferation of nuclear materials, and it is anticipated that the situation will likely intensify.

Therefore, I believe it is important for us to listen to the President's Dharma. Listening to the Dharma clarifies for us the compassionate working of Amida Tathagata that always embraces us as just as we are and never abandons us. Hence, we should share our appreciation and gratitude for it with as many people as possible. As Nembutsu followers who are guided by the Buddha's wisdom, it is important for us to take the initiative and actively carry out programs to cope with the numerous problems and issues in contemporary society. I feel that such efforts will contribute to the actualization of a

fulfillment.

It is my hope that this upcoming Commemoration of Accession shall become a significant event as the first major step of our organization. May this occasion serve as the impetus for the Hongwanji to effectively cope with the changing times while upholding the traditional religious values based on Amida Tathagata's unconditional compassion. The Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha administration is currently formulating new long-term plans in anticipation of the 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Jodo Shinshu Teaching. We kindly request your active cooperation and participation.

honored Rev. Dr. Alfred Bloom with the 2016 President's Award. The Award recognizes an individual's support for



the Institute since its founding in 1949. Previous recipients have been Prof. Taitetsu Unno (2014) and Prof. Lewis Lancaster (2015). The IBS, which serves as a Jodo Shinshu seminary, is affiliated with of the Buddhist Churches of America and the Graduate Theological Union in California. society in which everyone is able to live a life of spiritual The IBS has been providing graduate-level Buddhist,

ministerial, chaplaincy, and other educational programs in Berkeley, California for more than fifty years. The current IBS President, Rev. Kodo Umezu is also the Bishop of the Buddhist Churches of America. Rev. Dr. David Matsumoto, IBS Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs, and Director of the Center for Contemporary Shin Buddhist Studies presented this honor to Dr. Bloom at the Kailua Hongwanji Buddhist Temple, where Dr. Bloom still teaches through a "KO" discussion group several times a month.

In 1986, Dr. Bloom, a noted Shin Buddhist scholar, teacher and author, was appointed Dean and Head Professor of IBS after serving twenty-six years on the faculties of the University of Hawaii and the University of Oregon. During his tenure at University of Hawaii, Dr. Bloom was instrumental in establishing the Hawaii Buddhist Study | Fuku-Somu (Vice Governors) Rev. Wagyo Narukawa Center (BSC) on University Avenue. In early 1972, Dr. Bloom informed then-Bishop Kanmo Imamura about the sale

of the two original properties where today's BSC exists. Dr. Bloom retired in 1994. Rev. Bloom received Shin Buddhist Ordination in 1990 and Full Certification in 1994, and has been a member of the Hawaii Betsuin since the 1970's.




Pacífic Buddhist Academy News

The Pacific Buddhist Academy's 10th anniversary festival will be held on Sunday, April 10, at 4 p.m. at the Pearl City Cultural Center. The theme is Shin/The Heart and Mind of Taiko, calling forth the belief, spirit and heart of a tradition that began with PBA's founding and continues as it commences breaking ground for a new classroom building this year.

Taiko is an integral part of the curriculum at Pacific Buddhist Academy, the only high school in the United States with a Peace Curriculum based on Buddhist teachings. Considered a reflective art, Taiko is required for freshmen who may choose to continue to study it through their senior year. "Taiko builds a foundation for our students that enriches the mental, physical, and spiritual dimensions of their daily lives," said Sensei Jay Toyofuku, who has taught Taiko since the school's founding in 2003. All PBA students participate in the festival along with faculty and guest artists.

The long-awaited day has finally arrived! PBA's Classroom Building Project will get underway in early March, and will proceed with demolition of two vacant residential buildings, followed by grading and site work, then foundation and building construction.

The whole project is slated to last between ten to twelve months. During that period, PBA will work to keep all constituencies informed of the project progress and of how the construction project may affect those coming to the temple and campus. That information will come primarily through the following existing information sources:

- · PBA: the What's New bi-weekly newsletter
- . HMS: Gradelink
- · Hawaii Betsuin: the Goji newsletter
- Kyodan: the Headquarters Update

The construction company is Ralph S. Inouye Co. Ltd. (RSI), one of Hawaii's construction leaders. PBA is pleased to be working with RSI because of its sterling reputation and knowledge of the HHMH community.

Before demolition of the Tanaka House and Caretaker's Residence can take place, existing flooring and ceiling materials, as well as light fixtures and air conditioning units, must be removed because they contain hazardous materials requiring special handling. Unitek Contracting Group, one of the industry leaders in Hawaii, will perform all hazardous materials removal, adhering to the highest standards of compliance as required by Federal and State laws.

During the coming months, PBA's highest commitment is to community safety. We request that any questions or concerns regarding the project be routed directly to the main school office at (808) 532-2649. If you observe any activities that are in your opinion unsafe, we request you contact the school immediately so that appropriate measures can be undertaken.

This is for all of us an exciting moment in PBA's history. For your support in helping to advance educational excellence and Shin Buddhism in our community, we want to express our heartfelt gratitude. Getting to this point has required the dedication of us all. We will count on your continued support in the coming months to realize the dream of so many of Hawaii's Shin Buddhist leaders - Bishops Imamura, Yosemori, Okano and Matsumoto - and we look forward to celebrating the project completion in the near future.

Report on the 104th Legislative Assembly

Attendees: 95 delegates, 15 non-voting delegates, Directors & Advisors, 38 Observers, 3 Special Guests Aiea Delegates: Rev. Kosho Yagi, Warren Tamamoto, Russell Nonaka,

Aiea Observers: Frank/Helen Takenouchi, Thelma Kawaguchi, Susan Morishige

The 104th Legislative Assembly (Giseikai) was held on Feb 12-13, 2016, followed by the Aloha Luncheon and Living Treasures Banquet at 12:00 PM at the Hilton Hawaiian Village. The five honorees were Paul Leland Breese, Dr. Dennis Masao Ogawa, Sooriya Kumar, Dr. Puakea M Nogelmeier and Lillian Noda Yajima.

Resolution #1 HHMH 2016 Budget: Adopted as amended.

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Expense: \$1,298,640 // Funding Sources: \$485,210

2016 Assessment: \$813,430 (Last year was \$855,621).

Resolution #2 Amendments to the HHMH Bylaws: Adopted as amended by 2/3 vote. Changed allocation of Directors to the HHMH BOD and Delegates to the Legislative Assembly. Deleted Hawaii Fed of YBAs non-voting delegate. Modified language that indicated that each temple shall be represented by at least one delegate.

Resolution #3 Green Hongwanji Initiative. Adopted. Approved Green Hongwanji Initiative program that would educate, set goals, and develop an action plan to help temples and members live in ecological harmony within our communities. A committee will be tasked to implement this program.

Resolution #4 The HHMH Assessment Policy. Adopted as amended 51-40. Adopted an Assessment Policy that details the authority, determination method, administration, collection and application of assessments, and delinquency. The proposed policy was amended by deletion of the loss of benefits after two years of delinquency—loss of their minister.

Resolution #5 Technology for Remote Communication Adopted. A committee will be established to explore feasibility, method and cost of training and implementing the technology to support remote communication.

Resolution #9 Adopting "The Shin Buddhist Ministry in Hawaii" Document as HHMH Official Policy. Adopted. Adopted a policy that defines levels, roles, requirements, duties and responsibilities of all levels of ministerial vocation.
