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## Minister's Message

Quite often I get really upset, irritated or mad by miscommunication, misunderstanding, nasty word from someone and/or disgusting behavior of outsider. I know that I should control my anger but sometimes I get "Hotokeno Kaomo Sando Made" (means "Even the patience of a saint has limits") moment just recently.

After a while one story came in to my mind. Story called "A bag of nails".

There once was a young boy with a very bad temper. The boy's father wanted to teach him a lesson, so he gave him a bag of nails and told him that every time he lost his temper he must hammer a nail into their wooden fence.

On the first day of this lesson, the little boy had driven 37 nails into the fence. He was really mad!

Over the course of the next few weeks, the little boy began to control his temper, so the number of nails that were hammered into the fence dramatically decreased.

It wasn't long before the little boy discovered it was easier to hold his temper than to drive those nails into the fence.

Then, the day finally came when the little boy didn't lose his temper even once, and he became so proud of himself, he couldn't wait to tell his father.

Pleased, his father suggested that he now pull out one nail for each day that he could hold his temper.

Several weeks went by and the day finally came when the young boy was able to tell his father that all the nails were gone.

Very gently, the father took his son by the hand and led him to the fence.

"You have done very well, my son," he smiled, "but look at the holes in the fence. The fence will never be the same."

The little boy listened carefully as his father continued to speak.

"When you say things in anger, they leave permanent scars just like these. And no matter how many times you say you're sorry, the wounds will still be there."

The moral of the story is; unkind words cause lasting damage. Let our words be kind and sweet.

In the second volume of the Sutra of the Buddha of immeasurable Life, there is an important teaching about how we should lead our life:

All people in the world, parents and children, brothers and sisters, husbands and wives, other family members, and extended family members, should respect and love each other and should not hate and envy each other. They should share their possessions with each other, without being greedy, always speak gently, and live harmoniously without hurting each other.

Further, the sutra explains what will happen if we fight with each other or if we get angry with others:

Even a small amount of hatred among people makes them become hostile to each other in the present life, and this escalates into a mass of hostility among them in their lives to come. This is because in everyday matters they are persistently harming each other.

The sutra clarifies how important it is to be gentle and harmonious with each other in our daily life. Be kind and gentle to every living thing...

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hi everyone,

I hope you are well. We had an exciting week! You must all have been watching the news coverage of Hurricane Lane as it approached Hawaii. What a relief when it stalled and broke up. Hopefully you got through the storm unscathed. Unfortunately, many of our neighbors on the Big Island, Kauai and Maui experienced unbelievable rain and flooding.

We were watching Hurricane Lane very closely because it kept moving closer to Hawaii, just as we were finishing up preparations for O-Bon. It looked like we might have to cancel Bon for this year. On Wednesday evening a small group of workers took down the tarp "roof", sidewalls and floor of the Yagura. Then we weighted down the Yagura with the heavy metal benches from the Social Hall to keep it from blowing over. Fortunately we did not experience high winds. Still, better safe than sorry.

Friday morning, as it became more apparent that the storm was breaking up, we made a decision to have the Bon Service as scheduled and still have a "small" event in the Social Hall following the service. My pessimistic mind thought that we might just have 50 to 100 people here-mostly workers. Still, we proceeded to get the hall ready. Thanks to everyone's help, the Social Hall was transformed by hanging our red & white *chochin* with the name tags around the hall and the Yagura "skirt" onto the back of the stage. A "tower" was built in the center of the dance floor (yes, a pretty one!).

Saturday as the weather cleared, it became more apparent as the day went on that we might have more people show up than we expected. Many people called or texted us to see if Bon Dance was on at Aiea. We had already cancelled much of the food so we decided to just do the best we could. Saturday evening, with the weather relatively clear, people started arriving just like usual. Not sure how many people showed up. Perhaps 250 people showed up and we had food for 150. It was a madhouse in the kitchen. Somehow we survived. People were very appreciative that we were able to have our Bon celebration. I've been told that there were many good comments, in spite of the last minute preparations.

I must thank some people for going "beyond the call". Thanks to Mark F. for putting a lot of thought and hard work in preparations and planning for Bon (for weeks). Mark H. worked hard in the kitchen all night (sorry Mark I did not know that you didn't get to eat even). Diane O. prepared the chochin and windcatchers. Arlene S. organized the manpower. Claire hung the "skirt" and constructed a beautiful "Yagura". Garrett F. supplied the music. Thanks to the AHM Judo Club for the fantastic manpower support. Thanks Lori, Robin, Cindy, Janice and others. I can't name everyone who worked hard to make Bon a success. Please just accept a sincere thank you for your effort. By the way, if any of our Hongwanji family was affected by Tropical Storm Lane, please let us know and we will pass the information on to Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Headquarters.

This month we lost two giants in American history-Arethra Franklin, the "Queen of Soul" and John McCain, U. S. Senator from Arizona. Both had great influence on American culture and history. Senator John McCain's funeral will be this Saturday. I hope that you have time to watch the proceedings.

**URASENKE GANNENMONO KENCHASHIKI.**

Dr. Genshitsu Sen, the 15th Grand Master of the Urasenke tea school, performed a ceremonial tea offering (kencha) at the Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii Betsuin on July 19, 2018. The temple was filled by a number of people from Hawaii and Japan. Dr. Sen offered two cups of tea: one was offered to Amida Buddha, the other was offered in honor of Gannenmono, the first Japanese immigrants who arrived in Hawaii 150 years ago. It was Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii's honor to be able to receive Dr. Sen for this historical Kenchashiki.

**HONOULIULI BON SERVICE.** Hawaii Buddhist Council (HBC) and Japanese Cultural Center of Hawaii (JCCH) held the second Honouliuli Bon Service at the Honouliuli Internment Camp, located near Waipahu on Oahu, on Wednesday,



August 15. Bishop Eric Matsumoto and Rev. Kazunori Takahashi represented the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii and attended this service.

The Honouliuli Internment Camp was constructed to accommodate Japanese Americans also Italians and Germans during World War II. This camp was the only one built for prolonged detention on Oahu. It opened in 1943 and closed in 1946. In February 2017, the drum which was used for the Bon Services was found at the Nichiren Mission of Hawaii. Because of this discovery, HBC started the Bon Service in honor of those who had hardships at this camp. This site was designated as a National Monument in 2015, but it is not open to the public. JCCH is the organization to contact regarding this site.

**2018 PEACE DAY INTERFAITH CELEBRATION**

This year's Peace Day Interfaith Celebration is

coming up **Friday, September 21, 2018, 6:30 p.m. at Hawaii Betsuin.** The theme for this year's event is ***Cultivating Peace.***

In 2007, Hawaii passed a law declaring September 21<sup>st</sup> of each year as Peace Day to promote peace programs, improve international relations, and increase educational awareness of peace. Advocacy by Pacific Buddhist Academy students and Jr. YBA members played an important role in final approval of the bill.

Since then, the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii and co-sponsors have held annual celebration of peace on or near Peace Day, featuring speakers from diverse faith traditions as well as a variety of musical and dance performances. Pacific Buddhist Academy continues to play an important role in presenting the event. All are invited to this uplifting celebration of peace on September 21!

**RYUKOKU UNIVERSITY GRADUATE SCHOOL HAWAII SEMINAR.** 11 graduate school students with Professor Eisho Nasu and Associate Professor Bunei Takada of Ryukoku University Shin Buddhist Studies will have a Hawaii Seminar at various temples on the Big Island and Oahu from August 28 to September 5. This will be the seventh time for Ryukoku University to bring their students to Hawaii to hold this seminar. They will have lectures from Hawaii Kyodan ministers, participate in different activities and study the significance of Jodo Shinshu

propagation through learning how Jodo Shinshu Buddhism have been propagated in Hawaii. They will also participate in a part of the HHMH Joint Conference.

#### **EMERGENCY DISASTER RELATED ACTIONS**

Western Japan Flood. Summer 2018 flooding throughout western Japan has killed over 220 people and dislocated many thousands. The information on damages caused by the heavy rain is being updated. As of August 16th, at least 125 Jodo Shinshu temples were damaged. Members of at least 275 Jodo Shinshu temples were affected, with nearly 60 dead or missing. Hawaii Kyodan responded with an initial donation of \$5,000 to Honzan from the Social Welfare Fund to support Hongwanji-related temples and those who are affected from this disaster. In addition, "Western Japan Flood Relief Fund" was created, and it run through August 31, 2018. After this special collection, the collected contributions will be sent to Honzan.

Osaka Earthquake. On June 18, 2018, the 6.1 magnitude earthquake occurred in northern Osaka and affected a wide area of western Japan. As of August 3, Hongwanji in Kyoto, Ohtani Mausoleum, Dendoin (the Buddhist Institute for the Propagation of Buddhism) and at least 226 Jodo Shinshu temples were damaged. Members of more than 58 Jodo Shinshu temples were affected. Hawaii Kyodan decided to send a donation of \$5,000 to Honzan from the Social Welfare Fund.

Affirmation rites are officiated by the Bishop of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii. This ritual gives the recipient a definite awareness that s/he is becoming a follower of the Buddha's teachings and a member of the Hongwanji. During the rites, each recipient will receive his/her own Homyo (Dharma Buddhist Name) from the Bishop. If you wish to participate, application and fee (\$50) must be sent in by Sept. 15, 2018.




