

Minister's Message. On March 16 and 17, I went to Kona for their Ohigan Service and also conducted couple Memorial services because of they don't have resident minister until May. I enjoyed Kona Hongwanji after a long time. While in the Temple back room between memorial services, I found a beautiful box and shiny Buppanki (Rice offering container made with brass) inside of the box and on the side of the box says "Donated by Chiyono Sasaki". This reminds me a story of Hawaii's Myokonin, Mrs. Chiyono Sasaki.



The Kona district is famous for its world class coffee, beautiful beaches, and scenic beauty. Many of the original coffee growers were Japanese immigrants whose backbreaking labor produced the famous coffee which is still handpicked from trees grown on the steep slopes of Mauna Loa, an active volcano. Many of them attended the Kona Hongwanji Mission, located in the town of Kealakekua. The founding temple members gathered for religious and social purposes and writing Japanese poems was among the activities. In the 1990's, Reverend Tatsuo Muneto translated and compiled them in a book entitled, "Dharma Treasures, Spiritual Insights from Hawaii's Shin Buddhist Pioneers". Chiyono Sasaki, born in 1897 in the district of Kau on the opposite side of the island was one of the poets. Reverend Muneto writes, "Her early life was as hard and rocky as the bumpy roads on the Kona coffee farms. In order to attain some resolution of her problems she turned to other religions, but she detested any compromise with a religion that was idealistic. Although she believed that Amida Buddha was for her, no matter how much she listened to the teaching, nothing could quench her spiritual hunger." Reverend Muneto continues to explain her spiritual quest by saying, "Deeply troubled by her confusion, she could not resist calling on the Rev. Shuun Matsuura in Kealakekua. She was in desperate straits. One afternoon when Chiyono returned home to Keopu from the temple, her husband, Kumataro, who had just returned from laboring in the coffee fields, scolded her, shouting, 'You're always going to the temple! What for?' Chiyono replied, 'To listen.' 'After listening, what did you learn?' yelled her husband. 'Nothing,' she answered. Kumataro then said, 'What a fool you are!' Hearing those words, something flashed across Chiyono's inner being: 'Oh, today, I finally am able to truly listen. Yes, I am able to accept and embrace my foolish self.'" Reverend Muneto then comments, "This awakening to one's true nature as foolish and ignorant by Chiyono was made possible by the working of true compassion which completely enfolds and affirms her. Because of what she had learned from Rev. Matsuura about Amida's compassion directed to the foolish self, she realized her own foolish nature as it is by the critical words from her husband." She expressed this thought and feeling in the following poem:

When told that I was foolish, It was by the power of Primal Vow that led to my fall.

Rejoicing, I said Namu-amida-butsu, Namu-amida-butsu.

When I fell after being told to fall, I found myself on a lotus petal.

I am ashamed of myself, I am sorry: Tears of joy come streaming down.

Regardless of the sect of Buddhism pursued, we are all seekers of Universal Truth (Dharma), seeking, shinjin. Shinjin was first translated as "true faith" and attaining shinjin often refers to one's true and real devotion to the Buddha and the Teachings, the ultimate attainment of faith. However, within the last 30 years, Jodo Shinshu has translated shinjin as "true entrusting", to express the nature of achieving this state. Too often, I believe, we seek or work too hard towards this achievement. In Jodo Shinshu, shinjin is already given to us by the wisdom and compassion and the power of the unconditional vows, of the Buddha. In the Gobunsho "Shonin ichiryu no sho", Chapter on the Teaching of Shinran Shonin, Rennyo Shonin writes "Butsu no

kata yori..." translated as, "...settled by the Buddha through..." It indicates that saving grace and all other things are unconditionally given and provided to us by the wisdom and the unconditional love of the Buddha. Deep understanding and gratitude fills our entire being when we put our personal selfish pride and ego aside entrusting ourselves to the Buddha's loving vows. Mrs. Chiyono Sasaki's story is just one of many that help us to realize our true selves and the joy which awakens us when we are able to accept our selves just as we are.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hi everyone,

I hope you are well. We had a great O-Higan service this past Sunday. Our guest speaker was Rev. Satoshi *Ka'imipono* Tomioka from Puna Hongwanji on the Big Island. Rev. Tomioka spoke about our "circle" of loved ones, friends and associates. Our "circle of compassion" can be a good thing, because these are the people closest to you, who mean the most to you and often who think like you. However, a circle can become a negative thing, when it is used to exclude people who are different. So Rev. Tomioka reminds us to be compassionate, even to those who are outside our circle.

Rev. Tomioka then presented a workshop after the service in our Social Hall. The workshop was entitled "'Buddhism in Contemporary Music". AHM members, friends and Oahu temple members were invited. We had a nice crowd of about 60 people attending. Rev. Tomioka used contemporary songs, short stories and personal experiences to illustrate Buddhist teachings. He was funny, entertaining and a good teacher. By the way, *Ka'imipono* is a Hawaiian name given to him by Cecilia Lindo of the Hongwanji Mission School. It means "one who is a seeker of truth or righteousness". Ask him about it the next time you meet him. Thank you, Sensei Tomioka!

I want to share some thoughts from a nice article that I read in the Hawaiian Airlines magazine recently. The Blaisdell Hotel downtown has the oldest and prettiest elevator in Hawaii. It is a manually operated elevator with elegant ArtDeco metalwork. The story is mostly about the elevator operator, Javier who came to Hawaii from Cuba many years ago. Javier retired at age 60, got "fat and lazy" sitting at home and decided to get a job. He stumbled upon an ad for an elevator operator and fifteen years later, is still operating the elevator at the Blaisdell Hotel. Javier is happy in his job. He says, "*They'll have to fire me if they want me to go. The key to being happy is to always be useful to others.*"

HEADQUARTERS UPDATE

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BISHOP'S CORNER. Today, as I address you, as part of our effort to upgrade the Headquarters Update with this "Bishop's Corner," I would like to express my deep sadness and deepest condolences to those who were killed at the two New Zealand mosques and their families and friends including the local Muslim community here in Hawaii. The intensity and frequency of these terror attacks filled with hate is alarming to say the least and we should all be concerned. It can happen, anywhere and anyplace. While we should not let panic and fear rule our lives, it would be prudent to be prepared and have a plan of what to do in the event that something similar should happen locally.



As I reflect, a thought came to mind that possibly the greatest protection against such an attack occurring, in one way, may be our own individual awareness of ourselves. We are all human. We have ideals which we embrace and try live up to, but at the same time we are fragile and can be volatile. Our own worst enemy may not be someone else, but could be our own self. At Chinese and Japanese Buddhist Temples, many times, one will find a lion(s) depicted among peonies. The symbolism is that our worst enemy is not an external physical enemy of another, but rather the internal enemies of arrogance, self-centeredness, ignorance and hate to name a few which plague us. Just as the mighty lion has few external enemies, but a little parasite inside the lion's stomach can make the King of Beasts ill and can be cured only by the medicinal properties of the peonies. I remember a quote by Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who said, "Man is not our Enemy" "intolerance, fanaticism, dictatorship, cupidity, hatred and discrimination" are the real enemies" "which are present...in our very hearts and minds." If each and every person could come to this kind of realization it might contribute to a more peaceful and harmonious world through our humility.

For we, of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, let us focus on our Theme and Slogan "Embrace Change: Transformation (Walk in Peace)." May our temples resound with earnest Dharma discussion about what happens when we encounter Amida Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion. I have been emphasizing "Responding in gratitude to Amida Buddha's Great

Wisdom and Compassion" from 8 years ago. I have stated that all positive thoughts and actions arise from shinjin and/or our being nurtured by the Buddha's 12 Lights especially the Lights of Wisdom, Purity and Joy which address our ignorance, our greed and our anger/hatred like the peonies which save the lion. The inspiration and motivation comes from the Buddha and our (responsive) actions are guided by the Dharma or Teachings. Again, I ask, please embrace Gomonsu's "A Way of Living as a Nembutsu Follower" as a guide and the compilation which I have shared, many times, "Passages on (nurturing) the Sangha as reference for Dharma Messages and aspirations for meetings and gatherings, so that Nembutsu-sha/people of Nembutsu who reflect the Dharma are nurtured and contribute towards world peace and harmony through awareness and humility. As we, the Sangha, are nurtured and try to live the Dharma our temples can become, even more, places of refuge where people can experience less of the trauma and drama of samsara.

In our 130th year in Hawaii, let us embrace our Theme of "Embrace Change." In celebration of our 130th Anniversary, please remember my request that you observe our 130th Anniversary at the temple level so that more people will be able to celebrate our Anniversary (and not only those who can travel afar). Aside from the 130th Anniversary Inaugural Service we held at Giseikai or this year's Legislative Assembly, we will not be having a separate State-wide service and/or conference due to the fact that we just had the HHMH Joint Conference in 2018, we will be having the BWA World Convention this year in 2019 in San Francisco and coming up in 2023 there will be Shinran Shonin's 850th Birthday Observance and the 800th Anniversary of the Founding of the Denomination to be held in Japan.

An idea for 2019 is to use the Hawaii Kyodan Calendar one Sunday to go over the history of Hawaii Kyodan, but please refer to our Centennial publication, "A Grateful Past, A Promising Future" for more details and other information to honor the past, inspire (us of) the present and hopefully get the interest of future generations. Also, please focus on projects and programs as a way to celebrate our 130th Anniversary. Another project I ask of each temple and sangha including affiliate organizations and internal components is that of inviting or interacting with 1-2 target audiences that you as a temple or organization have never reached out to or interacted with. Please, I beseech you, please share your Joy, Gratitude and Awareness of Amida Buddha's Immense Wisdom and Compassion with others! Let us become, ever more, aware of Amida Buddha's Great Wisdom and Compassion, a compassion so great that it is known as a non-dichotomous great love or compassion which rejects no one and also become more wisely and acutely aware of our sometimes

negative tendencies. Let us not forget and lose sight of the hope and the encouragement we receive from Amida Buddha. Even as bonbu or a spiritually foolish one, illuminated and nurtured by the Buddha's Lights of Wisdom and Compassion, may we embrace (in grateful response) Shinran Shonin's aspiration of "May there be peace in the world, and may the Buddha's Teaching spread!"

There is no cost for this workshop, and it doesn't require an attorney. Light refreshments will be served. RSVP by April 15.


