Minister's Message.

This story occurred about 7 years ago when I was serving Honokaa Hongwanji.

Once I received a call from a mortuary in Hilo, about an hour's drive from Honokaa, where I resided, asked me to conduct a Buddhist funeral service. I checked my calendar and was able to accept.

I requested, and they e-mailed me, some details about the deceased.

Mrs. M was born in Nepal, she met and married Caucasian guy who brought her to the United States. They lived for some time in California, and then moved to Big Island. She loved sports and became a member of a golf club and some other community groups too.

She became ill and, after an examination, was informed that she had cancer. She joined a cancer support group where the patients comforted each other.

She passed away on the day I received the phone call, at the young age of 42. Surviving were her husband, a son and a daughter on Mainland.

On the day of the funeral, shortly after I arrived at the Chapel, the casket containing the deceased was wheeled into the room and placed in front of the Buddhist Altar. That was open casket funeral service. To the right side of the casket were placed photographs of the deceased.

I waited at the entrance until 11:00 a.m. when a mortuary staff escorted me in. I entered with striking the small hand held bell. Everyone was busy talking until then. With the first stroke of the bell, however, the room became silent. I bowed in front of the altar then offered incense. Because it was private funeral without MC, so, I went to the podium and explained the service procedure, and the importance of offering of incense in honor of the deceased.

I chanted opening sutra "San Bu Jo" the three respectful calling and then presented Mrs. M with her Dharma name. Following that, I began chanting the sutra "Shoshin-ge". While chanting, the immediate family came up to offering incense. After chanting, I gave a short Dharma talk, and concluded with a reading of a "White Ashes" from the Gobunsho (Epistles) by Rennyō Shōnin.

Then Mrs. M's husband, thanked everyone for attending. He continues to say following word (summary): "Those of you attending this service may be surprised at how different it is, but my children and I arranged to have a Buddhist service out of respect for my wife. We don't know anything about the Buddhist religion. We just wanted to show our respect to that religious tradition because it was so important to my late wife. We have placed picture of my wife next to the casket, so please look at them and remember her kindly as you leave. Thank you."

After service husband came to thank me and said "I think my wife is very happy for your beautiful Buddhist service. She had good life, too short but so nice and sweet life. She knew she's gone. She told me everything she wants."

Although he is a Caucasian with no knowledge or experience of Buddha-dharma, I admired Mrs. M's husband for the great respect that he showed his wife's religion.

In the Lager Sutra it says

Humans, who live in the midst of worldly passions, are born alone and die alone, leave alone and come alone. According to their actions, they go to painful or pleasant realms. People must receive their karmic consequences by themselves. No one else can take their place.

Yes, each of us live a "life" that "no one can live for us". However if we have someone to cuddle close together and talk to each other, listen to each other, we are able to have better

life, better way of leaving this world like this beautiful couple.

I hope you are well. We lost a valuable member recently. "Hisa" was a long-time Sangha member and Hosha gang helper. He was a "regular" on Thursdays and Sundays, often busy helping with repairs around the temple, temple beautification projects, set up for activities and clean up afterwards. Hisa was a member of the AHM Board of Directors and served as our Treasurer for many years. He spent many hours in the temple office carefully recording entries into our ledger books by hand. He was meticulous in his work. He was a die-hard Yankees fan. When the Yankees were in the World Series, he made an extra effort to get the game on TV in the Hosha area so everyone could watch. We spend many a Sunday afternoon outside the kitchen talking story and having a few drinks. Hisa was very dedicated to our temple and always put the temple needs above his own needs. Thank you, Hisa for all of your hard work for the benefit of our temple and for the many wonderful memories!

This past Sunday we had a very nice session on Advanced Care Planning, arranged by Rev. Yagi. Rev. Yagi is familiar with this topic through his work with Pali Momi Medical Center and the HHMH committee on End of Life Care. Our speaker was a representative for Kokua Mau ("Continuous Care"), a local non-profit organization dedicated to helping people talk about their wishes for end-of-life care. As our speaker pointed out, too often we don't discuss this with our loved ones when we are able to. This session gave us a chance to think about what we want for ourselves and make our wishes known.

The speaker encouraged us to think about such topics as: what matters to me at the end of life, how involved do I want my loved ones to be in my care and where do I want to receive my care. She introduced us to such terms as Advanced Care Planning (ACP), Advanced Directive (AD), Health Care Proxy (HCP), Provider Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (POLST) and Living Will. Thank you, Sensei Yagi for arranging this workshop.

I would like to inform you that this year our **O-Bon dance** will be held on **Saturday, July 27th**. We made this change because of a conflict with the University of Hawaii vs. Arizona football game at Aloha Stadium. Hope to see you all at our Bon Dance.

BISHOP'S CORNER. My thoughts as we honor Lady Eshinni and Lady Kakushinni in April

Recently, I attended a presentation offered by Kōkua Mau (Continuous Care in Hawaiian), an entity which provides information on advance care planning, hospice and palliative care in Hawaii. It was a presentation on what is traditionally known as "Ethical Wills" and sometimes "Spiritual Wills" and more recently "Legacy Letters." According to Wikipedia, "The content may not differ from writers of spiritual autobiographies or memoirs, but the intent makes an ethical will unique. "The generic purpose of the ethical will is to pass on wisdom and love to future generations." Writing can include family history and cultural and spiritual values; blessings and expressions of love for, pride in, hopes and dreams for children and grandchildren; life-lessons and wisdom of life experience; requests for forgiveness for regretted actions; the rationale for philanthropic and personal financial decisions; stories about the meaningful "stuff" for heirs to receive; clarification about and personalization of advance health directives; and requests for ways to be remembered after death." Please note that an Ethical Will is not a legal document. I was asked if we had something similar in the Jodo Shinshu Tradition. I could not think of anything widespread as a tradition and/or custom, but immediately what did come to mind was Lady Eshinni's Letters which she wrote to Lady Kakushinni, her daughter.

In one of her letters, Lady Eshinni laments to her daughter that they are physically separated with her in Niigata and Lady Kakushinni in Kyoto. She says "...I often think of your children and would like to hear the most recent news about them. Oh, will there ever be a chance for me to visit you, or for you to come to see me once more while I am alive?



Most likely not!" Lady Eshinni's Letter 10 continues with her saying "I am ready to go to the Pure Land at any moment. In the Pure Land we will be able to know everything clearly. So I hope that you shall live the life of nembutsu and come join me there. I know that if we can meet in the Pure Land, everything will become clear."

Here, Lady Eshinni is clearly expressing her deepest wish that her daughter will also entrust in Amida Buddha, recite the Nembutsu and also be born in the Pure Land where they will be able to meet again. To me, this is a very touching conversation between mother and child in which the mother is expressing and sharing her spirituality with her child.

Due to factors like World War II, Buddhism being a minority religion in America, the shift from 3 Generations living under a roof to nuclear families, and the misguided notion that if I encourage my family (to attend temple) I am forcing them to be Buddhists, many of us tend not to share too much about our Buddhist religion with family and friends. However, I would implore and humbly ask you to, please reconsider and, begin sharing what is important to you. Of course, conversing in person and now would be best, but if it is challenging, how about "Legacy Letter"? Please share with especially your family what is important to you!

As Lady Eshinni shared many other things about her husband Shinran Shonin with Lady Kakushinni, she was able to learn a lot about her father. For example, how kind and thoughtful person he was, how he was always concerned about others and trying to find a way to help others which ultimately was to share the Nembutsu Teaching with them. Thus, Lady Kakushinni was able to revere him and aspired to perpetuate Shinran Shonin's legacy through preserving his memory by becoming the Rusushiki or Caretaker of Shinran Shonin's Mausoleum which would eventually evolve into the Hongwanji.

In this respect, the correspondence, communications, the conversation, the letters between Lady Eshinni and Lady Kakushinni played

such an important role in the nurturing of Lady Kakushinni and the huge role she would play in the history of Jodo Shinshu. I hope that for us, in Hawaii Kyodan, we can regain this kind of conversation and sharing as it is one of the keys to our future to sustain and grow the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii both financially and spiritually.

Shinran Shonin wrote a hymn or wasan, "I praise Amida's wisdom and virtue so that beings with mature conditions throughout the ten quarters may hear. Let those who have realized shinjin constantly respond in gratitude to the Buddha's benevolence." You might say "I can't give a Dharma Message about Amida Buddha," but I would say "You can talk story" as we say in Hawaii. No doubt, the greatest praise to Amida Buddha is our reciting the Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu in our everyday life and living our life guided by the Dharma. Let us share our Dharma enriched life with others just as Lady Eshinni and Lady Kakushinni did with each other and others.

I conclude by quoting the late Bishop Yemyo Imamura "...the entire karma of events throughout this first decade in Hawaii is due to nothing but the manifestation of the compassion of the (Amida) Buddha." "To think of all those forgetting themselves for the Hongwanji to make today possible, I feel gratitude and am moved deeply even now." Thank you and Namo Amida Butsu/Entrusting in All-Inclusive Wisdom and All-Embracing Compassion.

- minimum of 12 college credits per semester.



COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL CONCERNS

Donation to Malama Kauai. A donation of \$5,360 from the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii was made to Malama Kauai on March 15, 2019. The donation will be used to help fund the "Mea'ai on Wheels" program guided by Malama Kauai to provide a daily meal to those still affected by the flooding which occurred in Spring 2018, specifically in the areas around Haena, Wainiha and Hanalei. The coordinator of the "Mea'ai on Wheels", Hana Neerings, said the program feeds 90 people per day on a budget of approximately \$300 per day. The program is designed for those who are still displaced, have no kitchen, are elderly or have a disabled child or adult in the home. Because of the condition of the road and the continued need to "caravan" in and out of the north shore area past Hanalei, a trip for groceries might involve a 5-hour trip instead of 1 hour trip, creating a hardship for many, especially the Kupuna. The meal served is a "hot, delicious and mostly organic" meal. As Neerings explained, "We have the best fed Kupuna on the island."

In 2004 the Legislative Assembly passed a resolution to unify the definition of membership for purposes of reporting our annual statistics and to help with the assessment proration:

Membership is based on family units as defined below:

- Two persons joined in marriage or civil union and their legal dependent(s).
- A single parent with his/her legal dependent(s),
- A single adult, whether or not he/she is living with another family unit.

Gojikai or Sustaining Membership Dues for Aiea Hongwanji Mission is \$125 per family unit.

To encourage the younger generation to become sustaining members, there is "discounted" dues of \$50 for those 40 years old or younger.

Membership in the Fujinkai or Buddhist Women's group is separate from Gojikai dues. Last issue, we had an insert to encourage Aiea Hongwanji Buddhist Women's Association membership and to update information for current members. Membership dues are \$10 per year per person. There are no family rates. The Aiea Hongwanji BWA is currently apart from the Statewide BWA network to better concentrate on temple support. 

Deadline for ordering is Friday, June 28, 2019.


